Talking Therapies

If life is proving too difficult, or you are feeling anxious or depressed, then Talking Therapies can help.

Talking Therapies Surrey is a free NHS service offering short-term psychological therapies for a range of common mental health problems.

There are five organisations that provide this service in Surrey. They are led by accredited therapists and can offer you help in different ways including in-person therapy, a live web chat, group video call, individual telephone call or guided e-learning. The service is for anyone aged 17 years and over who is experiencing anxiety or depression and is registered with a GP Practice in Surrey.

Powered Wheelchair and Long Cane Training

Habilitation Specialist, Sharn, works in the Children and Young People's Service (CYPS) team at the charity. When she received a referral for a young person that wanted training to use a powered wheelchair using a long cane, Sharn knew this was going to be a new challenge but one she was delighted to take on.

Sharn worked with Mary, a very experienced Habilitation Specialist, who has previous experience of training people to use a powered wheelchair and a long cane. The pair worked together to devise a training plan for Kaycie-Lea.

A setback to the plan occurred when her local council refused her funding application for a powered wheelchair on the grounds of her vision impairment. Sharn didn't let this set back stop them so she contacted Redhill Shop Mobility, who rented her a powered wheelchair, eventually giving Kaycie-Lea the wheelchair on free loan when they heard about the difficulties she was facing.

Sharn and Mary worked with Kaycie-Lea for nine months showing her how to operate the wheelchair whilst using a long cane. Kaycie-Lea now can travel independently around school and not have to rely on a teacher to push her around, giving her the independence she so desperately craved.

So rare is it to teach powered wheelchair training with a long cane, that Sharn was recently invited to the Habilitation Vision Impairment UK Conference in Birmingham to give three one-hour workshops on the topic of powered wheelchair and long cane training. Sharn told us, "It was very daunting speaking to so many people, including lecturers and fellow students, but it was good to impart the knowledge I have learnt and inspire others."

Sharn concluded, "Here at Sensory Services by Sight for Surrey we are all about empowerment and giving people the tools and training to live independent lives and this is exactly what we have done for Kaycie-Lea, which I am really proud of."

Google Accessibility Discovery Centre

The Children and Young People's Service (CYPS) team recently organised a trip to Google's flagship Accessibility Discovery Centre in London. Eight young people supported by the charity met with a member from the CYPS team at various train stations across Surrey. Here each person practised their public transport skills, including buying tickets, working out the times of the train and learning what platform they needed to be on. Everyone met at London Waterloo Station and then made their way to the Google offices.

The group had lunch at the Google restaurant and then headed off to the Accessibility Discovery Centre where they were shown some of the different technologies that are being used to play games including game controllers with eye gaze technology, Braille readers controlling phones and how a phone can help support taking a selfie for someone with a vision impairment. Everyone had a great day.

Resource & Technology Centre

Last year we helped over 2,350 people and we issued 4,219 pieces of equipment.

Our Resource Centre is a hidden gem in the heart of Surrey. An everexpanding hub of innovation with shelves stacked high with technology and tools for the kitchen and day to day living, plus gadgets and games that improve the daily lives of people with sensory impairments empowering them with the equipment and knowledge they need to remain independent.

BILL

Bill has visited the Resource Centre twice to find equipment to help him manage his sight and hearing loss. He told us, "The charity has very helpful, efficient and friendly and provided me with various pieces of equipment that have enabled me to complete tasks independently. I have received a cane, large print diary, task lamp and have signed up to receive Talking Books and Newspapers. The task lamp has been a godsend as before I got it, I couldn't see the food on my plate."

We also issued Bill with an Echo Radio Link and Sennheiser headphones to wear over his hearing aids which have enabled him to watch and listen to the TV which he missed.

We have been providing support to people who are Deaf and hard of hearing since 2016 and continuing our support to people who are deafblind. Recently there have been some changes to the Deaf Services team so below is our guide so you know who best to contact.

- Jane Andrews, Team Manager. Jane manages the Deaf Services team enabling them to work effectively. She tells us, "I love working with the team they are so hardworking, compassionate and professional."
- Emma Harrison, Senior Social Worker. Emma provides support to Deaf residents across Surrey ensuring they receive the help they need and working closely with locality colleagues.
- Cathy Parker. Cathy's role is new and she is responsible for developing the team's links with the Surrey Deaf community, she also runs our monthly Deaf cafes.
- Susanna McDonald, Social Worker. Susanna is a newly qualified social worker and has worked for the charity for over six years.

- Marion Gibbs and Holly Ritchie, Social Care Assistants. Marion and Holly cover duty, answering incoming calls, providing information and advice. They also coordinate care packages, assessment reviews and liaising with social workers.
- Julie Barclay, Deafblind Officer. Julie supports people who have a combined sight and hearing loss, providing specialist support and rehabilitation. Julie also runs the Deafblind Friendship Group.

Al Update

Google Live Transcribe: Breaking Communication Barriers for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing

Google Live Transcribe is a free Android app offering real-time captioning of spoken conversations. Live Transcribe uses advanced speech recognition to convert spoken language into text on a smartphone screen, providing a personal captioner for conversations and meetings.

Key Features and Benefits:

- Real-Time Transcription: Instant captions enable users to follow conversations effortlessly
- Multi-Language Support: Transcribes over 80 languages, crucial for diverse environments
- Customisable Text: Adjustable text size enhances readability
- Save Transcripts: Allows saving conversations for later review
- Sound Event Notification: Identifies sounds like knocks or alarms, increasing awareness
- External Microphone Support: Improves accuracy in noisy settings
- Vibration Feedback: Alerts users when someone starts speaking
- Accessibility in Diverse Situations: Useful in classrooms, workplaces, and social gatherings

Google Live Transcribe is available for free on Android devices via the Google Play Store. Please note that you will need Android version 12.0 (Snow Cone) or higher to install the app.

Seeing Al

Microsoft's Seeing AI app is a powerful and free tool, transforming a smartphone camera into an intelligent lens that narrates the surrounding environment.

By simply pointing a smartphone camera, users can hear descriptions of text, people, objects, and scenes, providing a wealth of information that enhances interactions with the world.

Key Features and Benefits:

- Short Text Reading: Instantly reads aloud text that appears in front of the camera, such as signs, labels, and price tags
- Document Reading: Scans and reads longer pieces of text, including letters, articles, and reports
- Product Identification: Recognises barcodes and announces the name of the product, aiding in shopping and organisation
- Scene Description: Provides an overall description of the environment captured by the camera, offering context and understanding of the surroundings
- People Recognition: Can recognize faces and announce the names of people the user has previously saved
- Currency Identification: Identifies different denominations of banknotes, making financial transactions easier and more secure
- Colour Identification: Announces the dominant colours in the camera's view, assisting with tasks like choosing clothing
- Handwriting Recognition (Preview): An evolving feature that attempts to decipher handwritten notes and documents
- Light Detection: Informs the user about the level of light in the environment
- Image Exploration: Allows users to explore photos by tapping on the screen to hear descriptions of different elements within the image

Braille Challenge UK Heats

Earlier in the year the UK heats of the International Braille Challenge took place at Woking High School.

Blind and vision impaired students from primary and secondary schools across the country were invited to participate in the heats which saw students challenged with various Braille reading, typing and comprehension tests, testing their speed, accuracy and understanding. Entry categories include Apprentice, Freshman, Sophomore Junior Varsity and Varsity. In-between the Braille challenges, students took part in lighter hearted Independent Living Skills lead by the Children and Young People's Service (CYPS) team from Sensory Services by Sight for Surrey. Everyone got to make, bake and taste a variety of sweet and savoury treats, practising measuring, mixing and munching!

Mrs Lock, Head of VI from Woking High School said, "The Braille Challenge is an inclusive event as it is open to blind and vision impaired students. Students need to show resilience and engagement, and we are seeing that in abundance!"

All entries were marked and then submitted to the US for assessment alongside entries from the US and Canada. The top 10 in each category will be invited to the finals in Los Angeles in June. Last year two young women from the UK made it to the finals, and Hayley, who we support, won her category. We are keeping everything crossed for the UK entries this year!

Our Meet Up Catch Ups have grown from strength to strength and we are hearing wonderful stories about friendships and getting to meet some amazing people.

James, aged 90, has recently started attending the Epsom Meet Up Catch Up. James was diagnosed with Macular Degeneration early in 2024 after he noticed he was having difficulties with his sight. He said, "I found it very hard to come to terms with my diagnosis and that I was going to lose my sight, and I had to stop driving, it was a real hammer blow to me.

I now catch the bus to Epsom and it is a 2-minute walk to Derby Square. Everyone at Meet Up Catch Up was very welcoming and wanted to have a chat. I have really enjoyed meeting other people that have a similar outlook in life."

James has also been into the resource centre to see Tony and has been issued with a task lamp and anti-glare glasses. James said, "The antiglare glasses are amazing, I can see more clearly with them on, whereas before I could not see the detail. I use the task lamp at home, and I take it to my weekly art class. I am very independent and like to do all my own cooking and the task lamp helps with this as I can see things more clearly.

It was a dark day I found out about my vision loss but with the support of Sensory Services by Sight for Surrey and other organisations, I have turned my life around!"

Sight and Hearing Loss and Dementia

Both sight and hearing loss may become more common with age. Their symptoms can sometimes resemble the early signs of dementia, which can make it harder to understand what's really going on. For someone living with dementia, these additional sensory problems can lead to increased confusion and difficulty communicating.

For example, a person might become disoriented or struggle to follow conversations. This overlap can make it challenging to tell whether symptoms are due to dementia or sensory loss. As a result, diagnosing dementia in someone with sight or hearing issues can be more difficult and vice versa.

There are several causes of sight loss in people with dementia, such as:

• Eye conditions (e.g., cataracts or macular degeneration)

- Other health conditions (e.g., stroke)
- Normal age-related changes to the eyes

Additionally, dementia can affect the brain's ability to process visual information, which means someone may have vision problems even if their eyes are physically healthy.

While dementia doesn't directly cause hearing loss, it can impact how a person understands and processes sounds. Hearing aids are often recommended to keep the auditory pathways active. However, people with dementia may still struggle to process what they hear. This might appear as if they're not hearing properly, when in fact they may just need more time to process what's been said. Using shorter, simpler sentences can help.

Helped by the Hearing Loss Team

An estimated 18 million people in the UK have hearing loss. In the last year we helped the people of Surrey on 453 occasions with hearing loss support.

Our teams visit individuals in their home and undertake a needs assessment offering practical advice, equipment and solutions to help them manage their hearing loss.

One lady we supported recently, Rosina, told us about the support she received from Caroline, one of our Hearing Loss Advisors and how it had transformed her life!

"I wore standard NHS hearing aids for many years but as my hearing deteriorated, I found myself missing conversations with family and friends. I hadn't been able to clearly hear telephone conversations or the TV for many years but then Caroline visited me. First, she suggested I change my hearing aids to a Bluetooth version, change my mobile to

one that was compatible with my new blue tooth hearing aids (Samsung) and get a TV streamer, which she provided, that plays the TV straight into my hearing aids.

Because of my mobility problems I have to spend more time at home, watching TV or on the phone to friends. With Caroline's advice and the brilliant equipment I am now using it has been a lifeline for me.

Caroline has really helped me, she has stuck with me and made sure I get all the help and equipment I need; I am so grateful for all her help and support, she has literally transformed my life!"

Our CYPS team organised a trip to the Chris McCausland comedy show at Dorking Halls for a group of blind and partially sighted young adults we support. The group, all over 18 years old, thoroughly enjoyed the show and even got to meet Chris after the show!

Sophie said, "The show was amazing. It's the first stand-up comedy performance that I've been to and I loved it! I'm a huge admirer of Chris, and even more so now that I've met him. I find the way he copes with his blindness truly inspiring."

Lee said, "It was a fun day with lots of laughs! Chris was so kind, friendly and funny!"

He told us, "I come into the offices and do administration volunteering which is giving me good experience of working in an office. I also help at events. I like helping people and it's good fun."

We have a number of volunteering opportunities available including home visitors, phone befrienders, drivers and helping at our events. Drivers need to bring people to our offices in Fetcham, or to one of our community hubs. Mileage is reimbursed at 45p per mile.
