Blinded by Methanol

Calum story was all over the news when he went on national TV to warn others of the dangers when travelling to countries where methanol poisoning is a concern. Calum became blind after consuming alcoholic drinks laced with the deadly chemical in Laos, South Asia.

The day after consuming the drinks Calum and his friend took a 24-hour bus ride to Vietnam. During the journey both Calum and his friend were unwell and experienced some light sensitivity, and they assumed they both had a stomach bug. As they crossed the border from Laos to Vietnam, Calum noticed his vision was not quite right and eventually his world went black.

After three weeks in hospital in Vietnam, Calum was flown back to the UK and admitted to a hospital in London for further tests. Calum was referred to us by the hospital in London and told us, "I received a call from Sensory Services by Sight for Surrey following the referral, offering help and support but I declined at first as I thought my sight might return, but when that didn't happen I got back in contact with them.

First, I received help from Gary, their Technology Trainer who showed me how to use a screen reader and voice over for iPhones which was really helpful as I hadn't been able to communicate with my friends since the incident."

Calum also received an assessment followed by daily living skills training which he told us, "Made such an improvement to my life. The liquid level indicator made a big difference as I could do something by myself like making my Dad a cup of tea."

Laura, one of our Sensory Specialist Workers, then started mobility training with Calum, showing him how to use a long cane and progressing to routes outside. Calum said, "The mobility training has been amazing, as for a while I couldn't go out at all."

The first route on Calum's agenda was to the gym. Laura carefully planned the safest route and broke it down into stages, which they practised together for weeks. Calum also practised this route with a friend, and in early September Calum stepped out from his house alone for the first time and walked to the gym unaided, ten months after losing his sight.

Laura said, "I knew he could do it and I am so proud of Calum."

Calum said, "I never thought I would be able to walk this route by myself. I have been practising a lot but always with someone. The first time from my house to the traffic lights and then from the top of the road to the gym, it's a good feeling, I feel a great sense of accomplishment. Without the help of Laura and the charity I wouldn't have been able to do this, I am so grateful."

Finding Friendships

Tori has been tutoring Gus to read Braille for free since they met. Tori started learning when he was four years old and now in his twenties is a proficient Braillist.

Gus said, "I am making progress with certain aspects of Braille but find others hard. I have got better at memorising the structure of the cells and dots, but I struggle with reading. I hope in time I will be able to differentiate words more easily but it's not a quick thing to learn Braille.

Tori said, "I think Gus is a bit hard on himself as when we started a few months ago he couldn't understand anything in Braille and now he can read a sentence. We get together about once a week plus I give him homework!"

Coming to Terms with My Vision Impairment

Kesh was in the health and fitness industry for over 30 years as a fitness coach before teaching and presenting in the fitness world. "During this whole time, I never told anyone about my vision impairment, only my family knew," Kesh told Signpost.

"I buried my head in the sand, but it got to a point this year that my vision had deteriorated so much I had to face up to the facts. Since doing that it's been a big weight off my shoulders."

Kesh developed myopia at the age of six years old and told us "I was one of two children in primary school who wore glasses, and it was a horrible time as I got badly bullied. By the time I was a teenager my prescription was -14 and my glasses were like jam jars.

In 2017 I was diagnosed with Glaucoma. I voluntarily gave up my driving licence after coming off my daughter's scooter as I hit a crack in the pavement I didn't see, and narrowly missed landing in the road, it was a wake-up call.

Throughout my 40's my vision slowly deteriorated, I had two eye operations which helped but still my vision deteriorated.

Now I am 52, and in February 2025 I was registered as Severely Sight Impaired. I didn't realise there was a whole community to support me, and I really want to get involved in advocacy.

I am due to start mobility training with Sensory Services by Sight for Surrey and I'm thankful for the next step in my vision impairment journey.

Volunteers Needed

We are in urgent need of new Home Visitors to visit some of the people we support in their home who are finding getting out and about a challenge. Can you help us reduce social isolation that many Deaf, blind, vision impaired and deafblind people can experience?

To become a volunteer Home Visitor, you just need to have an hour a week spare that you can dedicate to helping others in need in your community. We will match you with somebody that shares the same interests as you and lives nearby.

We also have other volunteering roles available including technology buddies, phone befrienders, children's events and hearing loss technology volunteers.

In addition, we also require Volunteer Drivers to bring the people we support into our offices in Fetcham and to our community hubs that take place each month across Surrey.

All these roles are voluntary, but we can reimburse you for your mileage at 45p per mile. The roles are fully flexible and can be tailored to your availability, you can choose to do as little, or as much as you want.

Volunteering is incredibly rewarding, but just don't take our word for it, here is what some of our volunteers have to say:

Volunteer David said, "The surprising reality about being a volunteer home visitor is that it's not about what you give as a befriender, but what you get back."

Volunteer Driver Gail said, "It is a privilege to help support such lovely people. I bring them into the charity for technology support and appointments at the Resource Centre. I am pleased to be able to play a small part in this service."

Deaf Awareness Training

We received a referral from a care home asking for a volunteer for a new resident. The person was experiencing a significant transition and language barriers as their only language is British Sign Language (BSL).

Our Deaf Social Work and Volunteering Teams worked together to identify the best approach to meet the person's needs. Our Social Worker, Susanna, developed an understanding of her needs by building a trusting relationship with weekly visits. It became apparent, that whilst her care needs were being met, her cultural and linguistic needs were not. As a result, she was becoming increasingly isolated and withdrawn.

We identified an opportunity to work with the care home to increase their Deaf Awareness, to support both the person and the wider team in understanding their needs.

Cathy, our Deaf Community Coordinator delivered Deaf Awareness Workshops for care home staff who were informed how important body language is for people who are Deaf, provided an understanding of Deaf culture and BSL to enable improved communication for the person. The volunteering team worked with Susanna and Cathy to identify, onboard and match an appropriate volunteer from the charity.

A member of the team from the care home shared "the Deaf Awareness Training has made a big difference, and we can now see the resident's face light up when we use our new skills to communicate to her in BSL."

A volunteer befriender will be visiting regularly to have a chat in BSL.

Cathy said, "We have made a real difference as a team."

Each car had dual foot controls, and the young people were each given a safety briefing before embarking on their drive.

Hayley said, "the supercar experience was amazing and driving fast is always something I have wanted to do; a once in a lifetime opportunity. It is also great to meet up with the friends I have made through coming to these events."

James went for a drive in the Nissan GTR and said, "I did it, I did it and I put my foot right to the floor!"

Tegan said, "It was great fun, and I put my foot down a few times. What a great experience."

Support After a Stroke

Patria had two strokes in February 2024 which resulted in Hemianopia, loss of one half of visual field in both eyes, and she was registered as Sight Impaired.

At the time of the stroke Patria was alone living in West Sussex and she struggled at home with the stairs and cooking in the kitchen. After having a fall Patria moved in with her brother who lived in Redhill in a ground floor flat as a temporary measure and once settled, she contacted Sensory Services by Sight for Surrey to organise help and support.

A Rehabilitation Support Worker (RSW) visited Patria at her brother's, and she told us, "The RSW explained all the things I didn't understand. I thought I was going mad as I couldn't locate things I had put down 10 minutes previously. They explained I was having visual hallucinations, very common with people with severe sight loss, called Charles Bonnett Syndrome. They also issued me with various pieces of equipment like a task lamp, liquid level indicator, bump-ons and a vision impairment badge I could wear when out, so people know I have sight loss.

I also received mobility long cane training which has given me my life back as I can now go out on my own, visit my daughter and go out walking which I love and have missed so much. Having the cane, people now keep their distance, whereas before I was getting knocked into, people can see the cane and know I have sight loss and are more respectful.

I also attend the Communication Class in Merstham, which I was reluctant to attend at first but I now love it. It is wonderful to speak to others in the same situation and makes me feel less isolated. During one of the classes I was shown how to use Siri on my phone so I can use it to call my brother, or 999 if I need help, which gives me peace of mind.

Another piece of equipment I was issued by the charity was Sun Shields which have been amazing as they stop the sun and glare from taking away the little bit of upper sight I have.

I have also had support from their Benefits team to help me receive what I am entitled to. If the team had not helped me, I wouldn't have known what to do."

With more and more people using Artificial Intelligence (AI) on a daily basis, we wanted to share with you a new app which competes with the likes of ChatGPT, Gemini and Claude to name a few.

Pi is a conversational AI app/assistant which aims to be more than just a fact-bot, it is designed to be empathetic, supportive and a companion to talk to at any time.

A major strength of Pi is its free live information feed. Users can ask about weather, transportation updates, news, or events in real-time and receive accurate, up-to-date responses.

Pi offers its conversational style and real-time information completely free. For people relying on assistive technology, not having to pay extra to stay informed removes an important affordability barrier.

Key Features of Pi:

- Free real-time information feed (news, weather, transport updates)
- Conversational AI companion with natural, friendly dialogue
- Accessible, uncluttered mobile interface for smooth navigation
- Available on iOS 14+ and Android 5.0+
- Completely free to use without subscription

Pi's free access, live updates, broad mobile support, and accessible design make it a practical everyday companion for those with sensory impairments.

The Pi app is accessible via mobile on both Apple iPhones and Android smartphones, available through the Apple App Store and Google Play Store.

To run Pi on an Apple device, you need iOS 14 or higher. For Android devices, Pi is compatible with Android 5.0 (Lollipop) or later. https://pi.ai/
